Following is response from DHS Research & Data Analysis Director, Tom Pullum:

DHS prepares a CR (couples) file for every survey that includes an MR file. It consists of women and men who agree in their identification of each other, based on v034 for the woman and mv034* for the man.

Your procedure identifies women and men in the same household who do not name each other as the partner or say they are not currently married. There are a few cases like this in most surveys. Some may be errors, due to misunderstanding of the question or interviewer mistakes, but probably some are not errors. In any case, I recommend that you compare your file with the CR file, which is constructed consistently for every survey. I hope other users have suggestions.
