The information is collected to identify children to whom questions related to malaria/fever and their treatment, should be asked. It is not intended to calculate fertility or mortality rates.

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Really, i thought the household listing page of the household questionnaire does cover that. For each child in the household, the line number of the caretaker (who in most cases is the mother but could be someone else) is asked. And the purpose of that is so you know who to interview to that child's health.

The household listing is used to determine children who slept under mosquito nets but it isn't used to determine children's treatment for malaria. Questions related to treatment for malaria is based on children of eligible women.
